

Increase knowledge of primary care practitioners around dementia diagnosis and care


Increase awareness of trainings and supports for family care partners

Age- and Dementia-Friendly Washington (raise awareness, reduce stigma, build connections)

Working Across Many Sectors to Amplify Progress

The dementia plan focuses on changing the trajectory and experience of dementia

- Reduce risks for dementia over the lifespan
- Increase public awareness and lessening stigma
- Catch it early to optimize treatment and planning
- Educate public and providers
- Support individuals living with cognitive impairment and dementia at all stages, and their family care partners




Building Dementia Capable Communities

- 3 AAA service areas



- Pilot program funded by the state legislature, 2021 & 2023
- Purpose is to:
 - Increase knowledge about dementia and how to respond (consumers and professionals)
 - Build new partnerships and approaches for a more dementiafriendly community
 - Develop and/or expand dementiacapable direct services



DSHS-Research and Data Analysis Evaluation – 2022-2024



146 Professional Trainings

99% of staff reported that training activities increased their capacity to support people living with memory loss or dementia.



138 new cross sector partnerships

Strengthened community partnerships and rural outreach. BDCC fostered new partnerships and deepened existing ones.



908 Clients Used Dementia-Capable Direct Services

95% of family caregivers reported the trainings and/or services helped them provide care for a person living with dementia.

58% of family caregivers reported the trainings and/or services help the person living with dementia stay longer at home.
